

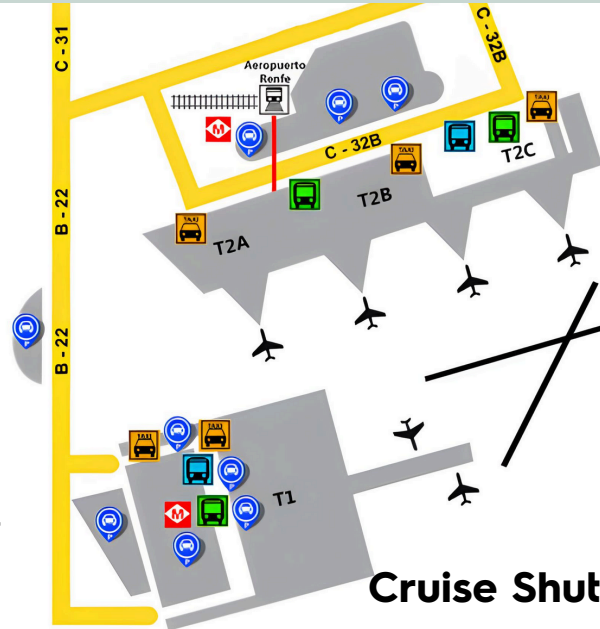
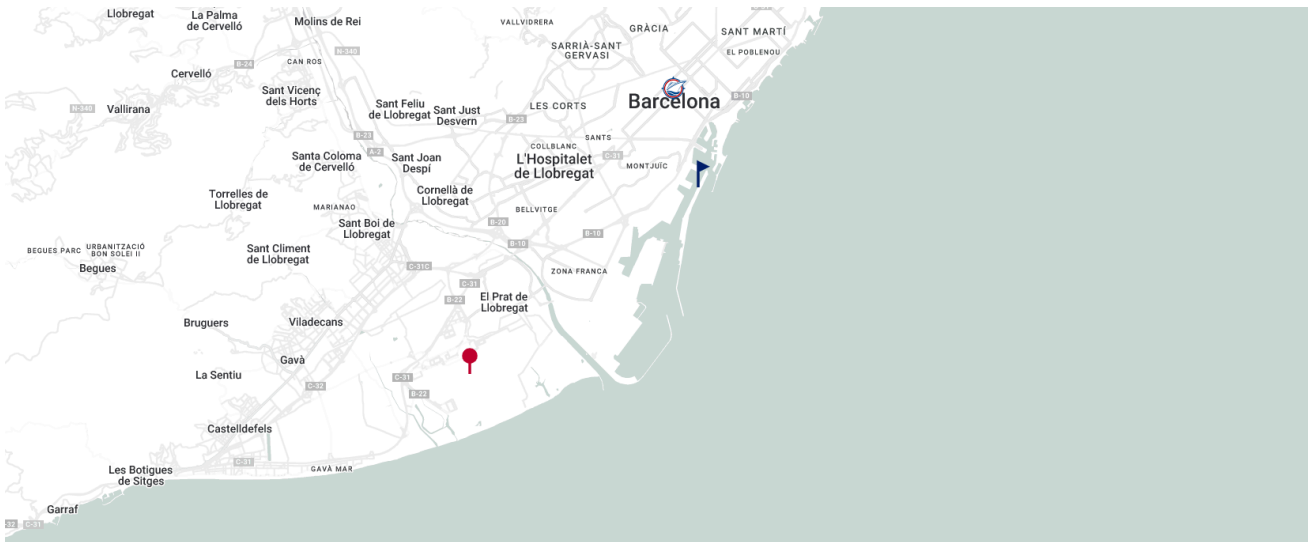


# Cruising from Barcelona

## Flying in

### Barcelona-El Prat Airport.

Located about 30 minutes from the port, Barcelona-El Prat Airport is the main international gateway for cruise passengers. The airport offers excellent connections to the city center and port via taxi, shuttle, or bus services. There are numerous hotels and restaurants both at the airport and along the route to the cruise port.



### Taxis

Available at both terminals.

- Terminal 1: Exit hall, ground floor
- Terminal 2: Outside arrivals area
- Look for black and yellow taxis
- Fixed rates available to the cruise port
- Journey time approximately 30 minutes

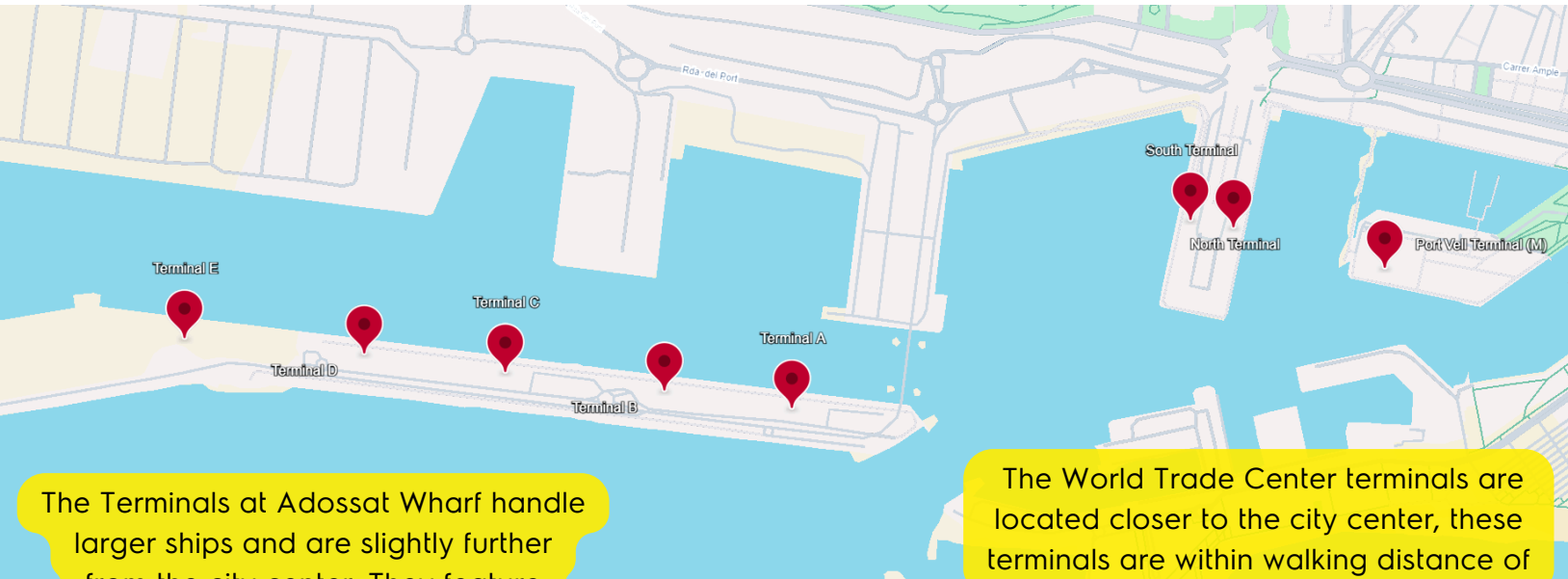
### Cruise Shuttle

Available on sailing days.  
Meeting points clearly marked in arrival halls. Pre-booking recommended. Representatives will be available to assist.

# Port of Barcelona Terminals

One of Europe's leading cruise ports, the Port of Barcelona features seven terminals with excellent facilities. Located close to the city center, it offers easy access to Barcelona's main attractions. The port area includes shopping, dining, and various services for cruise passengers.

The cruise terminals are arranged in two main areas: Adossat Wharf (Terminals A, B, C, D and E) and World Trade Center (North, South, and East terminals). Each area is easily accessible by taxi or shuttle services.



The Terminals at Adossat Wharf handle larger ships and are slightly further from the city center. They feature modern facilities and are connected to the city via the Port Bus Service.

The World Trade Center terminals are located closer to the city center, these terminals are within walking distance of Las Ramblas and other attractions. Perfect for smaller and medium-sized cruise ships.

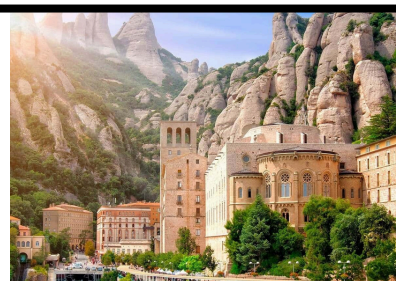
### Sagrada Família

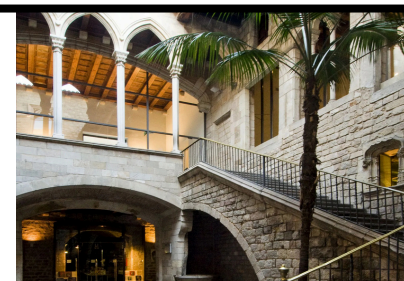
### Gothic Quarter/La Rambla
